


FUNERAL WORSHIP PREPLANNING

INTRODUCTION

No one wants to think about their own death and funeral. However, preplanning for the funeral service can be a tremendous gift to your family. At a time of great loss and grief, your family will be faced with not only their emotions, but with a host of decisions to make. Funeral preplanning informs them of your personal preferences, it provides them guidance, and it affords you the opportunity to witness to your loved ones by setting forth a Christ-centered service of worship that proclaims Easter hope.



The intent of this “Funeral Worship Preplanning” is to allow you to make *suggestions* to your family regarding the funeral service. The word “suggestions” is emphasized, because you should allow your family flexibility in the funeral arrangements they make. Further, it is recommended that you discuss funeral worship plans with family and provide them with a copy of your suggestions. A “Funeral Worship Preplanning Worksheet” is provided as part of this publication so that you can write down your preferences.

THE FUNERAL

The funeral or memorial service is first and foremost the worship of the Lord of Life and a celebration of the cross and empty tomb that gives believers in Christ the hope of everlasting life. While the funeral honors, remembers, and celebrates the life of the deceased, the heart of a funeral is always the gift of life that God grants. This good news meets death head-on, provides hope and comfort to all who worship, and proclaims Christ as Lord of both the living and the dead. It is the pastor's responsibility to ensure that the proclamation of Easter life is strongly present in music, Scripture, message, prayer, and liturgy.

WORSHIP CONSIDERATIONS

In the brief time leading up to the funeral or memorial service, the pastor will visit with your family about the worship service and attending logistics. The following information will help you make suggestions to your family.

- **Location of Worship Service** Although there may be unusual reasons for funerals or memorials to be held at the funeral home, you are strongly encouraged to hold worship in the sanctuary or chapel of the church. This is where the people of God regularly gather to hear the good news of Jesus Christ. Holding the service in the sanctuary or chapel helps all who attend more clearly understand that what we do at a funeral is worship.

• **Music** Funerals are occasions to sing the great music of the church that witness to the Lord of life. Secular music is not appropriate for worship, but could be played at the funeral home visitation or other setting. The pastor will help you determine if a song is appropriate for music or not, but a guiding question to ask is, “Does this music give glory to God and witness to our hope in Jesus Christ?”

Congregational Hymns – Hymns that the congregation sings are strongly encouraged. Singing involves the congregation and allows everyone to give expression to the faith we hold. It is usually wise to select hymns that are both singable and more commonly known. Typically, three hymns are sufficient. Listed below are hymns that you might consider. All are from *Evangelical Lutheran Worship*, the worship book at St. John’s Lutheran Church.

Other Music – Soloists or instrumentalists are frequently part of praising God at funerals or memorial services. The church usually arranges for these skilled musicians. While it is acceptable to have a friend or relative provide such music, they should have the music abilities necessary and the emotional strength to sing or play at a time when they may be grieving. Music in addition to congregational hymns is optional and family members should not feel obligated to arrange for it.

Again, only music that reflects our trust in Christ is appropriate at a funeral. One or two anthems are usually done. Below are possible anthems to assist you in communicating preferences to your family. Many congregational hymns can also be done as anthems; if a number is listed after the title, it can be found in *Evangelical Lutheran Worship*.

• **Scripture Readings** The worship service usually has three readings from the Bible; at least one should be a text from one of the four Gospels. A funeral is a gathering of believers who assemble to hear good news from God's Word. Scripture read at funerals or memorial services reflect our hope and trust in Jesus Christ. The pastor will want to know if you have favorite passages. To assist you, below you will find possible selections.

• **Officiating Pastor** The called pastor of St. John's Lutheran Church will officiate. If you have a relationship with another pastor or if you have a clergy relative, speak to the pastor about having an assisting role in the service.

• **Tributes** Personal tributes are sometimes delivered at funerals, but are generally discouraged. Too often those offering remembrances are ill equipped to speak in public, especially during an emotionally difficult time. The pastor will certainly make many personal references during the sermon, but it is important to remember that our worship focuses upon God's good news of resurrection life, not upon the goodness or achievements of the deceased.

• **Pall** For those funerals where a casket is present, a white cloth covering called a "pall" will be placed over the casket before it is brought into the sanctuary at the beginning of the worship. The pall symbolizes the righteousness of Christ with which we are "clothed" or "covered" through our Baptism.

• **Luncheon** If your family wishes to have a meal or dessert following worship, the Women of St. John's Lutheran will serve it for a small fee. This fellowship time is very important for families and friends as they support each other and enjoy one another's company. The pastor will ask family to approximate how many people will attend the luncheon. If the funeral is scheduled mid-afternoon, your family may decide that dessert is preferable to a lunch.

If there is a graveside committal at a cemetery as part of the funeral, two options are possible. The committal can be done immediately after the funeral; then, everyone returns to the church for the luncheon. Or, the luncheon can be held immediately after worship with the committal to follow later

(this second option is often done during winter weather as a courtesy to guests or when the cemetery is of considerable distance from the church).

• **Memorial Gifts** Many choose to designate one or more memorial recipients to which gifts are given in lieu of flowers. There are many worthwhile charities and associations, but we hope you will consider including St. John's Lutheran Church as a memorial recipient.

OTHER CONSIDERATIONS


• **Consult Family** It is important to reiterate that the plans you make for your funeral be done in consultation with family members. It should be your intent to provide *guidance only* for the decisions they will make, not create strict directives that would be difficult or uncomfortable for family to honor. Allow your family the flexibility they need to make good decisions regarding your funeral. Be in conversation with them about your preferences and the arrangements you suggest.

• **Cremation** There are some who worry that cremation might not be a Christian practice. Cremation is a matter of personal preference and is completely acceptable from a Christian perspective. The people of God speak of "dust to dust" and "ashes to ashes;" it makes no difference whether we return to the dust of the ground slowly or quickly. Again, cremation should be talked about with family members if this is your preference.

• **Memorial Garden** St. John's Lutheran Church has a memorial garden where ashes may be interred. Contact the church office at 203-322-0066 if you are interested in a resting place on the grounds of the church.

• **Pastoral Assistance** If you wish to discuss any of your funeral or memorial arrangements with the pastor at St. John's Lutheran, he/she would welcome a conversation with you.

• **Preplanning** The next page provides a preplanning worksheet for the funeral or memorial worship wherein you can state your suggestions to family members. Once you've completed the preplanning worksheet, it is suggested that you do the following:



- Provide a copy of your preplanning to your family members.
- Provide a copy of your preplanning to the church; it will be retained in a confidential file.
- Keep a copy of your preplanning with your will and other legal documents.

Remember, your preplanning is not intended to be ironclad directives to those who will work with the pastor to plan your funeral or memorial worship. Your preplanning lets your family know what arrangements, music, and Scripture are important to you. Knowing your preferences will be a significant, helpful guide for them.
